

I may have shared part of this before, but it came to mind. I once worked for a woman in my previous job years ago who would change the rules to whatever benefitted her at the moment. It was basically often a "do as I say, not as I do", and standards seemed to change according to what benefitted her at the moment. She would expect you to do such and such because she was on the other side, but then would totally flip things 180 degrees to benefit her when the positions were reversed. I can't remember who coined it, but the term "same rules don't apply" started being bandied about at work. I even think sometimes it would be changed to S.R.D.A. for people to say it more freely to each other.

I also remembered how we would have visits from the brass. They were often presented by the district manager as a secret he had found out in advance, and was passing on to us to bust our rears and get the store to a certain standard before the visit. Never mind that the standard was unreasonable for an operating store to obtain. The brass either didn't realize, forgot, or never knew what working in an operating store was like. They wanted essentially a museum. Nonetheless, we would work our tails off to get the store, backroom and all spiffed up, among other things. We had a closet at the original location that was only accessible from the outside alley where we stored old wood shelving that was used on the walls. There were times things were hidden in there before a visit. It could be overstock, no longer carried items waiting for them to send us markdowns or return labels for, and the like. I remember a woman messing with one of my sections in the store that I ordered. She was going to tear off and thrown away shelf labels and spread out stock we had because the warehouse had shorted the times that belonged in the empty space(s). She acted like they wouldn't listen or understand that it was not our fault. The problem is, at that point we had no way to make our own labels and we ordered the store stock ourselves. I was fortunate to stop her (even though she was my boss) and talk her in to putting the tags on the empty shelves underneath the stock we were going to fill the section in, so that I could put the labels back where they belonged when they left, and would have the info to keep reordering until the warehouse got it back and stock and sent to us.

I started thinking of employees who have known how the "play the game" and fool people on the outside looking in. They managed to either suck up and fake their way with higher ups, or they managed to make it look like they were doing as they should, knowing just how to fool people. Sometimes they were maybe never found out. Other times they were found out later (sometimes by their successor) when the whole thing avalanched. I admit to wanting people to see how things really were, and at times would get frustrated over their prospering in spite of their deception often not only at the company's expense, but those of us picking up the slack, or else taken for granted while the schmoozer or deceiver got ahead.

There were at least a few gospel singers who were honest about becoming saved years or decades into their careers. They were previously on stage singing and maybe even testifying. I don't think any were wolves in sheep's clothing, they may have believed what they said, and either thought they were saved, had doubts they were fighting, or maybe just said and did the right things expected (known as "playing church"). Nonetheless, they eventually realized they were not saved. There was a time where maybe many faithful (maybe as good as they could be on their own) people sitting in pews and unsaved. Now, I am not sure they even make it to the pews.

I then started thinking of the end times and eternity. You see, it is easy for church people to sort of play a part. You see, we learn the right ways to behave as we are supposed to, or try to meet expectations, or sometimes even fake our way to meeting those expectations. Some may try to change God's rules because the rules cost us. All along the way, God sees the heart. He knows the unpleasant things. He knows what is real and not. Come judgement day, all of the storerooms with hidden garbage will come to light. God actually already knows. How we are perceived to others isn't as important as what is real, and whether our sins are forgiven. We may fool some of the people all of the time, all of the people some of the time, but God none of the time!
