

In winter and spring of 1944, the allied forces of New Zealand, Britain, India, Poland, Canada, and the United States invaded Italy and fought against a massive and well fortified German force on the beaches of Anzio and advanced toward the Gustave line with its fortress position of the Monastery at Monte Cassino. Part of the offensive, was to put resources away from northern Europe in preparation of D-day June 6, 1944, but the main reason was to take Italy away from the Axis powers. The Germans with the high ground pounded the allied troops for more than four months in back and forth fighting. The Allies had 105,000 casualties in the whole of the campaign, losing 800 men a day.

As I sat and listened to the accounts of this fighting and the incredible bravery of the men of the First Armored Division who fought there and who remembered with tears in their eyes for the friends they lost there I felt so inadequate to even sit in the company of men of such honor and courage. My father-in-law was telling about his part in the battle, driving an ambulance taking the wounded to the field hospitals or to the beach to board the ship hospitals: He told about digging in with a hole large enough to fit the ambulance underneath a tank that had been destroyed by artillery fire. And now (68 years later) laughing at the new recruits who would stick their heads out when they heard incoming shells, (but, he said they would not do it twice). I talked to a man named Joe (a tank commander) who had been taken prisoner earlier in North Africa at the Kasserine pass, and the pain he went through. As I listened to these men the word sacrifice kept coming to my mind. We tend to forget how much some have given that the rest of us can live in freedom and peace.

The men of the First Armored Division now head quartered at Fort Bliss in El Paso, Texas, have not forgotten. They held a huge banquet for these World War II veterans and the other members of the First Armored Division from its fledgling days when they entered into their first battles, to the men now on active duty. As General Patard spoke and introduced the veterans of Afghanistan, Iraq, the first Iraq war, Korea, and Viet Nam, each received recognition but it was the men who fought in Northern Africa, Anzio and across Italy now all between the ages of 87 and 94 who received the well deserved standing ovation.

We met some incredible men and saw some incredible equipment in El Paso (I got to drive an Abrams m1a tank simulator) but as we drove home my mind kept going back to those words "Sacrifice" "Honor" "Bravery". The men today share those same traits with the men who stood on the beaches of Anzio. They train at Fort Bliss, in the deserts of west Texas and East New Mexico where a 105 degree day is considered cool, they still are willing to fight and even die if need be to protect our freedom and peace. It was very moving to see these brothers and sisters in arms sharing the stories and sharing the mutual respect for the service they have given. They will not forget the sacrifices of those who almost seventy years ago started the first armored division and fought and many times died for their country, I pray we do not forget either.

We recently observed Labor Day and the election will be here before we know it. I have been thinking about how many laws, committees, rules, etc. with which we have to deal. Now, I am sure unions were probably created because there were some bosses and companies who took advantage of their strength and position to bully and abuse workers. I suspect some unions still help prevent this today. Then on the other end of the pendulum you have some unions bullying employers where some workers can get by with not doing their jobs due to protection from the unions. Life would be so much simpler and better if each employee and employer simply lived by the Golden Rule and would do what is right (regardless of who held the upper hand). I have seen companies abuse and take advantage of employees and I have seen employees get by with what they can get by with as well. It seems that the pendulum swings back and forth at times. Whoever has the most power seems to abuse it and don't do as they should. It seems that people will get by with whatever they can get by with regardless of what is right or wrong. There seems to be little honor left in the world at times. I have seen changes in working conditions in my short time in the workforce during the past three decades or so. Often the changes were not for the better. It seemed before that workers and companies would have long, successful, mutually beneficial partnerships. Somewhere all of that seems to have changed. Companies often had no allegiance to employees nor did employees to the companies. Each seemed to be out to get what they could get and to get by with whatever they could.

I had a friend many years ago who was in a professional job that dealt with the public. For many years there was an extreme shortage in people who could fill his position. The company had to get people from other locations or towns to fill in for vacations and such. This shortage went on for well over a decade and perhaps a good deal longer. Finally, the company found itself with a small overage of people who could do this job. Not a lot mind you, but still a bit more than needed. They cut the amount of total hours with which he and his fellow workers (in this vocation) had to work. He was the highest ranking one in this position, so he tried calling to get answers. His calls were ignored. Now, this friend was great at his job, well-liked and a good person. After getting the brush off, he applied to their competitor who was more than happy to hire him. They were less than a block away from where he had worked and put a "welcome" with his name on their sign for all of his previous customers to see. Another one in that position quit and went to yet another competitor. Then some months down the line another had an accident and passed away. The company due to its arrogance and cockiness (because they felt they had everyone over the barrelhead) found themselves with a big shortage again and I am not sure if they ever fully recovered. I am not sure that my friend might not have stayed had they simply talked with him, but they didn't. Although I don't know this, I suspect they lost customers due to his leaving and the competitor who hired him got many of said customers.

Just imagine, had Adam and Eve not introduced sin into this world, there would be no need for so many laws. These laws are attempts to make up for our sin-nature and force us to do what we should or pay the price. How much easier and pleasant would life be if each person just did what was right because it was right? This leads to character, in my opinion. People have different definitions for character, but people without character can still do the right things at times, but for the wrong reasons. It has been said (and I tend to agree) that character is revealed in what people do when no one is watching. For instance they might not steal if they know they are being watched and there is a chance of getting caught and punished. However, they might do so if someone isn't watching (even though we know that God is always watching). So, the fact that they didn't steal in the first scenario doesn't make them people of character, it just means they might not want to take the risk. I also want to add that character is when people do things because they are right regardless of what they might receive out of doing so or even if they have to pay a price for doing the right thing. Doing right can cost us sometimes, but I think God often honors that here on earth. However, even if He doesn't here or right away, I have to believe that He will in the next life.


Another big thank you goes to Darla Cox for all her work with our Gramz Bakery fundraiser. We raised \$415.00.



Boys must be 11 years old or older, and younger than 18 to join Scouting.



Applying Bible Principles

The vast majority of people like to excel at something. Most of us like to do what we do in a manner that is truly first-class. Whether we are involved in one of the trades, or whether we are working in a profession, we like to excel in what we do.

Similarly, in the Christian life, most of us like to demonstrate our love for the Lord in ways that will reflect properly on Him and that will bring honor to Him. As His servants, we take great care that our Christian service is of such quality that what we do for His sake is first-class. Thus, whether we sing a solo in a worship service at church, prepare a meal for someone who is a shut-in, or teach a Bible class, we strive to do what we do for God in the very best way possible.

The Apostle Paul indicates we are also to excel in the grace of giving. "... just as you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in complete earnestness and in your love for us—see that you also excel in this grace of giving" (2 Cor. 8:7). In other words, just as we might seek to excel in other ways which demonstrate our Christian faith in action, we are also to excel in the grace of giving.

In the context of the verse we just read, Paul commends the Macedonian Christians for giving as much as they were able and more. When we follow their example, we experience "grace giving" in action, not only giving as we are able, but also, giving beyond our ability. This is possible only as we demonstrate the fruit of the Christian life by the power of the Holy Spirit within us. As we step out by faith (which is one of the signs of a Spirit-controlled life), we are able to give in ways which might seem improbable or impossible at first. The Spirit of God thereby motivates us and compels us to excel in the grace of giving!

One anonymous writer penned these powerful words: "God has a storehouse of blessings. Prayer is the key to that storehouse. But faith both turns the key and unlocks the door."

Say, are you excelling in the grace of giving? If not, why not take God at His Word—by faith—and begin today?

Red Bird mission trip is October 14-20 at Beverly, KY. Several of our church family will attend. Please keep them in your prayers.


Men's Emmaus Walk is October 14-20 and the Women's Emmaus Walk is October 25-28. Please keep the people attending the walks in your prayers.
