

The fact that I couldn't remember when my head hurt was fascinating to me. I thought of God. God remembers even the prayers we've forgotten. What I had thought at that time was that I would no longer be in pain due to some miraculous event. However, that did not happen. But over time, the headaches gradually left me without me noticing.

There may be moments of miraculous change, but there is also a continuous, steady transformation. God changes us every day and takes care of us daily. The prayers we offer may not seem to be answered immediately, but when we look back later, God has faithfully responded.

If we don't pray, we miss out on God's gifts. Will you join me today in deep conversation with God, joining your hands in prayer?

As a child, I was thin, sensitive, frequently got sick, and often had headaches. Now, I have become a less sensitive, less sick middle-aged man who has gained weight. This is related to last month's article. Sometimes the "same rules don't apply" that a former manager applied to herself in action, comes from the other side of the proverbial coin. People hold certain folks to a higher standard, and change those standards when it is someone they like, or perhaps with some sort of social status I think I shared before, a time when the cashier at my previous job needed a break, so I ran the register to relieve her. I was working on stock that was within reach of the register between customers, when the manager scolded me for working that stock saying "don't work on that stock, leave that stock for the cashier!" "I am the cashier, I am giving her a break" I replied. "Oh" he said, and walked off without a word. I kid you not, it was only a few weeks (maybe even the next week) when a pretty employee who wasn't the cashier at that point was working on the same stock at the same area (working beside the woman who was the cashier, as I recall), leaving no doubt that one of them was not the cashier. He walked by, socialized a moment, and never said a word to them about it.

I have a friend (a hard, capable worker) who once told about how a woman she worked with who used her figure (I am rewording how my friend worded it) to get by with things with her male boss. While my friend was a diligent, long-time, hard worker, the woman being attractive and knowing how to "work it" got advantages including not doing a lot of her work (as I understood, and remember it). That reminds me of a married delivery driver who a friend's son said sat on the male boss' lap and would flirt. In doing so, she would get preferential treatment. It can be difficult not to make allowances or show favoritism to people we like, people who are like us, people who have looks, magnetism, the ability to fool people etc. Sometimes those can be even be con artists. In my early years of being in management, a female worker thought I was showing favoritism towards another female worker in a particular situation, but it was merely an oversight on my part. I had my hands full working on something myself, there was an employee arrive for her shift, and ask if I wanted her to work on something. I told her that was fine. But, I really hadn't stopped to consider the other employee who had been working on the register a few hours. So instead of having the newly arrived employee to take the register to relieve her, and the one who had been there since opening doing another duty, in my busyness and several employees working to manage, failed to look at the entire picture.

Sadly, sometimes even the church shows favoritism to pastors, members etc. How many times have churches reassigned pastors with moral failures to another congregation (either to sweep the incident under the carpet, or maybe just because they like the person)? I am in no way saying we should throw our wounded away (whoever they are), but there were times that the pastor would go somewhere else and wreak havoc on another person's life the same way as where he had left, and do so over and over again. That is only one way, I am sure. Sometimes that standard of punishment or not (or rewards) is reserved to how well that person was liked, and not by keeping consistent punishments or merit.

I have shared before about the person I knew who had gone into a furniture store to look at furniture after having painted. No one would give her the time of day dressed so shabbily, and judging her by it. Then she went to the same store in her business attire a few days later, and the staff fell all over themselves trying to help her. She was the same person, but they judged her by her attire. The Bible is clear that God is against favoritism, but I think it has become such a natural thing that people don't even realize they are doing it. I think it could be an issue with most of us if we aren't diligent.

It is easy to want to be nice to and hang around some or all of the pretty, the popular, the powerful, the rich. Yet, sometimes the pretty person is ugly inside, the popular vain, the powerful heartless, the rich ruthless. Certainly not definite, but what is inside is more important and sometimes confused with the exterior. I also think that God has a special place in His heart for the disenfranchised, the poor, the hurting. He is sympathetic to their plight. That certainly isn't to say that He doesn't love and didn't die for all of us. But, He also sees past the external or station in life, to see who each really is on the inside.

Finally, in John 14:2, Jesus tells His disciples that He will go to prepare a place for us ... so we will have shelter eternally with Him in heaven.


God will give us all we need ... all we need to do is call upon His name!
