One thing about the Bible is that we can usually identify with people in it. I started to name some of mine, but there are so many. It is great to see ones who have not only struggled or failed, but were used by God any-how, and whose failures were not the end of their stories. It is also nice to have people in our lives we can identify with. Some inspire us, and some may help us through places they have already been.

I can safely say that each of us have blessings, and I think it is safe to say that no matter what most of us struggling with (or lacking), there are people in Columbus (let alone the world) whose lives are worse, and would gladly trade places with us.

We look at people at times through the lens of our lives. This can be great at times, but other times a detriment. I read a while back about people judging a local person in their neighborhood for the condition of their yard. Someone said something to the effect of "maybe that person doesn't have the health or a lawnmower to mow it, or maybe they have kids they are struggling to raise". They went on to say that maybe the person complaining should go and ask if everything is okay, and volunteer to mow for them.

It is easy to look at someone and think "that person should get a job", "that person should paint their house, it looks awful", "why doesn't that stranded person just call a mechanic" or "that person's clothes are old". While those may be true, we are judging according to our lives, our blessings, our resources, and our skills. While sometimes those people are indeed being irresponsible, lazy, etc., sometimes they may be overwhelmed, their health not good, they're lacking in funds for even a simple repair, and so forth. Maybe sometimes they just don't know the way out of their situation or lack the health, skill, or resources even if they know how. Something absolutely simple for someone more skilled in house or car repairs, is insurmountable or very difficult for the other person. A \$1000.00 bill for one might be equitable to a \$100 to another with vast more resources, and a \$500.00 bill might as well be a million to another. It is relative to the person and situation.

A former pastor once made a comment during a sermon that when buying a new car, one should buy one the same color and style so people wouldn't know you had bought a new car. I can't recall his reasoning (maybe I focused on that comment instead of what else he said), but that sounded fairly stupid to me as a twenty something. But, perhaps I understand it now. Sometimes when we are bragging about our blessings (maybe even out of thankfulness) someone in the conversation may not be as fortunate. While we are talking about a new car, our health, family, investments, new house, children (pick your blessings), someone in the conversation may be struggling paying the rent, or finding their next meal, or maybe are estranged from a child.

I caught myself at times talking about doing something with family, getting such and such to eat or whatever with a less fortunate out of state friend. I apologized to her (she had strained relationships with her siblings, and also struggled at times financially). She said not to worry, and assured me she loved to hear about friends' blessings. That is typically how I have been too, but there have been times of struggle where it was harder to do. I also saw the aforementioned friend be frustrated over their lack and someone else's abundance, in times of their being in dire need at times too...

A friend from High School and her husband posted pictures years back, of new cars they bought. I was truly happy for them. But, over time, it seemed like one, the other, or both were posting about a new car(s) every few months, and that was about all I ever saw them post. It wasn't their thanking God or seem to be out of gratefulness for their blessings. Maybe it happened less frequently than every few months, but I got sick of it after numerous times. This wasn't out of jealousy, it just seemed to be their bragging, or at least an emphasis on what they had. Don't get me wrong, they have a right to spend their money however they please, and I am not saying we shouldn't be able to share something positive in our lives. I am grateful that my 19 year old car (that I have had 13 years) gets me where I need to go. I just go to the point where their posts were too much. We are still Facebook friends, but I unfollowed both of them a few years back, so I wouldn't have to keep seeing these posts. Bear in mind this is after seeing probably 8 different new cars among them in two years.

It is my hope in this Thanksgiving season (and beyond) that we realize how blessed we are, but are also mindful of those less fortunate. Who knows, there may even be a way we can be a blessing to those people. It is also my hope that we concentrate on the Giver of gifts, more than the gifts themselves,

#### White Creek Lutheran Thanksgiving Dinner November 19 at 3 p.m.


White Creek will be sharing a Thanksgiving dinner with ECUMC. Meat, drinks, rolls will be provided. Table service will be provided.
