Let's Trust God's Will!

May the peace of God be with you all.

Today, I want to share a story from An Introduction to the Devout Life by St. Francis de Sales. There was a monk named Zephyro who, one day, found himself overwhelmed by a deep spiritual dryness. He lost all sense of comfort and felt as though he was trapped in darkness. He struggled with strong temptations and despair, thinking about the friends, family, and possessions he had left behind. Feeling utterly hopeless, he couldn't bring himself to do anything.

A friend approached him and asked, "Zephyro, what's wrong? You seem more troubled and sad than usual. Is something bothering you?" Zephyro sighed deeply and replied, "I feel like there's no joy left for me in life."

The friend, feeling great pity for him, shared this with their teacher, St. Bernard. Concerned about the danger Zephyro was in, the saint went into a roadside church to pray for him. Meanwhile, exhausted, Zephyro fell asleep, resting his head on a stone.

When St. Bernard finished praying and returned, a friend found Zephyro awake and smiling brightly. Surprised by the sudden change, the friend laughed and said, "Earlier, you told me you'd never feel joy again. Now it seems like you'll never feel sorrow again!"

Reflecting on this story, St. Francis offers the following advice:

- 1. When someone begins their journey of faith, God often allows them to taste the joy of heaven.
- 2. At times, in His divine wisdom, God may withhold comfort to test and strengthen our faith.

3. During spiritual dryness, temptations can rise like a fierce storm. In those moments, we must give our all to resist.

4. When we feel discouraged and hopeless, we must not conclude, like Zephyro, that there is no joy left for us. Even in the darkness, we must hope for the light. Avoid making bold claims about future joy or sorrow, and remain humble.

5. Confiding in a spiritual friend who can offer comfort is one of the good ways to find healing.

Ultimately, this story reminds us that God and the devil have very different purposes. God allows trials to purify our hearts, strip away selfishness, and help us fully trust and serve Him. If we endure patiently, God's comfort will surely come.

As I read this story, I, too, was reminded of these truths. At times, we may feel that God is distant or even absent. Yet, if we endure through the dryness, God will pour His sweet, living water upon us. So, let us not lose heart but trust in God's will and persevere!

I am sure most of you have seen "The Brady Bunch at some point in your lives. I felt like Mike Brady earlier. There was an episode where Cindy was being teased about her lisp by Buddy Hinton, and then Peter got called chicken for not fighting when he tried to get Buddy to stop. I was working on slides one day, when Frank Cole called. He wanted to pick up the labels and instructions for the Samaritan's Purse Christmas shoe boxes on his way back from work. I told him I was here, and would be happy to let him in. I asked what time he would be passing by, told him I would grab lunch, and be back before he got here. I already didn't want to be away too long, and his coming made it more necessary to be quick. As I was driving, the light was green, but the lady just sat there apparently oblivious that she could go. I said out loud (towards her) "what are you doing?" and it hit me. I heard my own words (that I hope were inspired by God) from the newsletter article that hadn't even been published at that point (though in my defense I had written it over a month before) that referred to impatience in traffic. At least I didn't tell myself to shut up like Mike did.


As fate might have it, I was pulling into the bank a few minutes later, when someone started backing out in front of me. I am happy to report that my reaction was much better. I then pulled around the corner at the drive thru, and someone was just sitting there when there was a lane open for them. I again, reacted properly, in fact, I didn't really react at all to either of the latter two other than my driving.

It is easy sometimes to give advice (even great advice), but not always easy to actually follow the advice (even if it is our own). To be fair, our words (accurate though they be) can lose a lot of power if we preach one thing, and do another. Someone like Jimmy Swaggart preaching against sexual sin and then being caught in it can result in folks calling them a hypocrite (at times joyfully so because they feel justified in their own sin, thinking the words aren't true, or do not work). The fact is, we ALL fall short of the mark. I know of at least two of the four pastors I have worked under have shared in their sermons that they fell short too, and were preaching to themselves too. I am certainly not an exception.

I think the key is to let folks know that we are human and fail too (even when we are striving to grow and heed the words). I think the other thing is our spirit. Are we humble and loving in our delivery (and our normal manner) or foaming at the mouth and ranting and raving, quick to see the speck in someone else's eye while ignoring the beam in ours?

Pastor Jongmin recently mentioned a particular sin in part of a message that I think many pastors are afraid to deliver in more modern times, as many in the world believe the opposite (sometimes militantly so) and get angry fast when challenged. But, Jongmin's loving spirit and delivery was perfect. He also didn't exclusively single out that one sin (that isn't a remote temptation for us), and included other sins that could hit closer to home for some of us. Other pastors who speak against it with a different delivery are not necessarily unloving (though some may be), but their delivery could make the receiver less apt to see that love, and from heeding the message.

The world wants to dismiss Christianity, and sadly at times we Christians (or at least those who either claim to be, or who they know attend a church) are not the best representatives of our faith. Nonetheless, we should still preach the Word in love. While satan loves to see us fall on our faces and fail, he also wants to silence the Word (and discourage us from sharing to begin with because we know our own failures). Either way, he wins (albeit it temporarily). To me the answer is share the truth in love and acknowledge that we fail (though we are striving to do it right) instead of acting like, and maybe even believing, we are perfect. If the world sees this, they are a lot more likely to listen and heed what we say. The words are truth regardless, and they would be wise to heed them in spite of whether the messenger is the perfect or not. But at times the messenger does affect whether or not they listen. I have seen repeatedly from people who believe that time is short. I have felt that way too. Regardless of how much time God waits until Christ's return, we don't know how long each person has before they die without knowing Christ. So, our work is cut out for us either way.
