

The people of Israel often broke God's laws, turned their backs on His Word, and fell into sin time and again. God disciplined them to bring them back to Him, and they would repent after facing consequences. Yet, not long after, they would fall back into the same sins. Their transgressions seemed endless.

But the amazing thing is this: God's grace has always gone one step further than human sin. Even when we have sinned a hundred times and deserve to be abandoned, God has forgiven us a hundred and one times. When we think we are beyond forgiveness, God gives us yet another chance. That is why we call it grace.

God has the same heart toward us. He never gives up on us. He continually extends His hand of grace to us, even when we are stuck in the depths of sin.

"Take my hand! Come out of there!"

Beloved brothers and sisters, let us trust in the God who never gives up on us. Let us take hold of His hand and live in His grace. This is our testimony and our song of praise. Hallelujah, Amen!

A Note from Terry Snyder

I don't recall if I have mentioned this here before or not, but I have felt for years (if not decades) that 2 Timothy 1-5 has described the world, and it has only gotten worse since then.

But understand this: In the last days terrible times will come. 2For men will be lovers of themselves, lovers of money, boastful, arrogant, abusive, disobedient to their parents, ungrateful, unholy, 3unloving, unforgiving, slanderous, without self-control, brutal, without love of good, 4traitorous, reckless, conceited, lovers of pleasure rather than lovers of God, 5having a form of godliness but denying its power.

Sadly, the world has infiltrated churches and of course politics. There has been some discussion on politics in recent weeks, and I am saddened over the amount of people who carry the name of Christ by saying they are Christians, but support evil. I don't mean that everything political is Biblical or vice versa, but some immoral things have become politicized.

There is some wiggle room in how severe we think certain problems are, or the solutions on how to fix them. There is also in what problems we prioritize (or even think ARE problems). Sometimes folks may even use God and the Bible on both sides in these. I may even go so far as to say that there may be wrong views on both sides as far as what issues are, and how to fix them. But, then there are things the Bible speaks against, that even some denominations are promoting. I saw a retired minister's daughter post that she doesn't tell people what to do in a situation that she may never understand herself. Using that argument, I guess we shouldn't punish people who do anything whose life experiences are different than ours, or if we can't be one hundred percent sure how we would react. (As if our reaction or lack of strength is what defines what is right or wrong). I also saw a talented gospel music arranger say his faith "evolved" and said that "If God can't love me just as I am, then that is not the kind of God I want to worship and serve the rest of my life." Let me clarify that his version of God's love meant that he didn't have to change, and could live as he pleased (at least in a major thing).

I have responded wrongly at times in my life. But that doesn't negate that God defines what is right and wrong regardless of whether or not we can live up to His expectations every time. While we might understand falling because we are human and don't always take the proverbial way out, these do not change that it is wrong.

It saddens me that the church in some places, has lost its way. I wonder at times how much longer the Lord will tarry. So many churches seem to have let the world influence them rather than the church influence the world. But, ultimately the things they believe in are not Biblical, or are a twisted version of it (much like the serpent used). Some have the idea that a Christian is always supposed to be meek and mild, but forget about Christ against the Pharisees or the money changers. I am in no way saying that that should be our default behavior, or that everything merits that degree of response. By the same token, it shows that standing against evil sometimes merits a response beyond what the world expects Christians to be like (which may be something like holding hands singing Kum Ba Yah while going along to get along), By the same token, some groups are so hateful to sinners that their behavior may keep the folks from ever becoming Christians because the love isn't visible, if there at all. The difference is in using wisdom to know what and how we are to respond following Christ's example.

I think about a single candle in a dark, dark room. Sometimes that candle is surrounded by total darkness, and the light it emits IS seen, even if the darkness seems overpowering. Of course Christ is the ultimate Light and He dispels any darkness. We are to carry the light in a darkened world. Darkness (evil) may seemingly be overpowering us at the moment (though we know Christ wins). But, that light makes a difference and can help lead people home.

Please have all donations in by Sunday, Nov. 17th.




### October 31 5-7:00pm
